Kelmscott Manor is a Listed Grade I manor house on the National Heritage List for England.

Situated in the Cotswold village of Kelmscott, it was built in around 1600 for local farmer, Thomas Turner, and his family. Originally called Lower House, it became Kelmscott Manor in 1864 when James Turner purchased 53.5 acres of manorial land, together with the lordship.

The manor is now most famously known as the inspirational summer home of Victorian designer and campaigner William Morris. Today, it is owned by The Society of Antiquaries of London, and is open to the public on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays from April to the end of October.

Ahead of the 2024 opening, PFS were asked to install a CCTV system at the property to help monitor visitor flow and improve security.
